AN INVITATION TO A HOLY LENT

On Ash Wednesday, priests across the church invited Episcopalians to the observance of a holy Lent with the following words from the Book of Common Prayer:

"I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by selfexamination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and *meditating on God's holy Word.*" (BCP, p. 265)



How is God calling you to keep a holy Lent? How will the above invitation, issued to every faithful Episcopalian, take shape in your particular life? Here are a few suggestions:

- Make Saturday/Sunday worship a priority. It's not optional. It's our duty and delight to worship God week after week. And I invite you to call someone you haven't seen in worship in a while. Call on friends who are looking for a church family. Ask them to join you!
- Pray and read the Bible every day. One way to do this is to join Episcopalians (as well as myself) from across the country at the Forward Movement Website: Daily Prayer: A Resource of Forward Movement (https://prayer.forwardmovement.org/pray). This website has the entire daily office that is both in print and read aloud that can be accessed from any web browser. There is even an App that can be installed where it plays automatically every day.
- Give alms to those in need. Consider a donation to our music ministry, my discretionary account, or the SEFT (Syrian Relief Fund).
- Fast from something to take something on. For example, use the money you would spend on a selfpleasure for a local charity or our music program at Holy Trinity. Or you could use that time normally spent in front of the TV to read a book by C.S. Lewis.
- Participate in our mid-week Lenten Eucharist, Lunch with the Rector, and Bible Study following lunch that will continue to cover the Gospel of John led by David Kalvedge.

The purpose of Lent is not to beat ourselves up. Rather, it's to realize more fully how much we depend on God moment by moment and to grow closer to God in relationship. A holy Lent, rightly observed, shows us how much God loves each and every one of us — so much that he gave his only Son that those who believe on him would not perish, but have everlasting life. Finally, as we all journey through the wilderness of Lent towards the Great Paschal feast that is Easter, please check the Weekly Reminder emails and the service bulletins for dates, times, and details about upcoming events during Lent and Holy Week.




The custom of "chalking the door" during Epiphany is an old tradition that began in Eastern Europe. The custom echoes the Passover when the Jewish people sprinkled lamb's blood over their doorways as an invocation of God's blessing for their household. During Epiphany, the village priest went to every home in his parish with specially-blessed Epiphany water and chalk. When he entered each home, he prayed special prayers and blessed every room in the house. Before leaving the home, the priest then chalked the lintel of the door with the year and the initials of the Magi – Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. The Magi's initials also stand for a Latin house blessing, "Christus mansionem benedicat" which means "May Christ bless this house."

Today, because the size of parishes have increased and most priests cannot visit every home, the head of the household is permitted to perform a basic Epiphany house blessing using specially-blessed holy water and chalk provided by the parish. This year, because he is new to Holy Trinity, Fr. Keith visited the home of every parishioner who requested a blessing in order to get to know us better. Next year, the plan is to make specially-blessed chalk and copies of the house blessing liturgy available for every household to "chalk their doors."



SHROVE TUESDAY





The word "shrove" is a form of the English word "shrive" which means to receive absolution for one's sins after confession and fulfilling the resulting penance. Pancakes are connected with Shrove Tuesday as a way to use up rich foods such as eggs, milk, and sugar before the 40 days of fasting.



For the first time in many years, Holy Trinity held a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. Music filled Sifford Hall and the delicious aroma of bacon and eggs and pancakes with syrup was everywhere. Over 80 attendees enjoyed the good food and drink, laughter, and good fellowship.











BURNING THE PALMS

After the pancake supper, Fr. Keith and Deacon Brenda led the short service to burn palms leftover from previous Palm Sunday processions. The flame to burn the palms came from the Paschal Candle with the help of a fireplace lighter and a piece of paper because the wind was blowing. The burned ashes are used to mark the foreheads of the faithful on Ash Wednesday.



KING CAKE





King Cake, also called a Three Kings Cake, is associated with Epiphany which celebrates the arrival of the Magi (Three Kings) who delivered gifts to the Christ Child. The shape, size, and ingredients of the King Cake are variable, but in all of the cakes, a small figurine representing the Christ Child is hidden inside. Today, the figurine is usually a "baby." After the cake is cut, whoever gets the "baby" wins a prize. At Holy Trinity's Mardi Gras lunch, there were many King Cakes and thus many "babies." Per Fr. Keith, whoever gets a "baby" is obligated to purchase the King Cakes for next year's Mardi Gras feast. Ask the Masons how that worked out for them this year.





ALLELUIA!

Alleluia (sometimes written "Hallelujah") is rooted in a Hebrew expression that means "praise the Lord." It is used in church services as a word of exclamation and praise. Because of the solemnity of the Lenten season, "Alleluia" is not used during the 40 days of reflection and sacrifice between Passover and Easter. "Alleluia" is "buried" during Lent. During the Easter Vigil, the priest intones the "Great Alleluia" and, on Easter morning, as Christians joyfully celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, "Alleluia" appears in many songs, liturgies, and services, usually in sets of three. "Alleluia" praises are then used until Lent comes again.

Holy Trinity celebrated Mardi Gras at its services on February 19th, the last Sunday before Lent. During the service, Fr. Keith called the children in the congregation to come up to the front. He sat with them and talked about what is coming. Although the little girls associated this season with the coming of the Easter bunny, they did join Fr. Keith and the congregation in saying the last "Alleluias" until Easter.

THE ASHES ON ASH WEDNESDAY

The practice of marking worshippers' foreheads with ashes in the shape of a cross is one of Christianity's most visible rituals. The ashes used on Ash Wednesday are meant to represent dust. When receiving ashes on their foreheads, parishioners hear the words: "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This is a reference to what God says to Adam when exiling him from the Garden of Eden. Also, in the Christian Bible, Adam is literally formed from dust. On Ash Wednesday, the saying is a reminder to be humble in the face of mortality.



The first Ash Wednesday ceremonies were likely held sometime in the 11th century AD. The practice is never mentioned in the Bible, but there is a verse in the Book of Daniel that links fasting to ashes. Some scholars believe this is the origin of the Lenten practice.

Everyone enjoyed gumbo, rice, cheese garlic grits, Cajun brunch casserole, French bread, King Cake, and their beverage of choice.

whatever is needed — in order to put on our various activities. There is not room in this VE to list or picture them all. Thank you all!




